

THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - NOVEMBER 3, 2024

This weekend (Nov. 2nd/3rd), the Church celebrates the **Thirty-first Sunday** in Ordinary Time. Nearing the end of our liturgical year, our focus is ever more so clearly on the centrality of Jesus for our salvation. Recognizing Jesus as our Savior, we must ask ourselves if we maintain an intimate communion with Him on a daily basis, through prayer and the Sacraments.

We are called to enter into this relationship with the Lord each and everyday of our lives. Truly, we are made for Him. Or, in the words of St. Paul: "Our true citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:20). This journey towards our true homeland has already begun. We walk it everyday. Does our life, here and now, reflect an intimate communion with the Lord as seen through our love of Him and of our neighbor?

This focus on our true homeland of heaven is reflected not only in our liturgical calendar, but also in the month of November. This month, as seen by our recent celebrations and commemorations, is one dedicated to the Holy Souls. We are invited to pray in a special way throughout this month for our deceased loved ones and all those who have gone before us. See the included insert for suggestions and indulgences available throughout this month.

This Tuesday, November 5th, our nation concludes another election season. Though our true homeland is heaven, we are still called to participate in our nation's political and public life. It is our responsibility to learn more of Catholic teaching and tradition, to participate in Church life, to learn from trustworthy sources about the issues facing our communities, and to do our best to make wise judgments about candidates and government actions.

As it often seems that election seasons are a time of anxiety and spiritual trials, I offer an encouraging practice suggested by our national bishops' conference: "Take time away from social media and spend time with Holy Scripture and the Blessed Sacrament. Turn off the TV and the podcast, and listen in silence... Pray often." As a reminder, our Church is always open for prayer. Never hesitate to come and spend time with the King of Kings.

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST - OUR FATHER

Following Holy, Holy, we enter into the central point of the Liturgy of the Eucharist: The Consecration. Given how often we focus on this topic, the very pinnacle of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we will move forward in this treatment to focus on other portions of the liturgy. As our Lord is made present to us on the altar in the Holy Eucharist, we proclaim the Mystery of **Faith** and conclude the Eucharistic Prayer with the **Final Doxology**.

The **Final Doxology**, coming from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans (Romans 11:36), recognizes that all things come from, are caused by, and exist for God as we lift up the Body and Blood of Christ towards the heavens. Fittingly, we respond to this praise of the Father with the **Great Amen**. We, like the angels, respond in gratitude to Jesus and His Sacrifice, eager to join our voices to the praise of God with our collective Amen.

Standing together as one in the Body of Christ, we now dare to recognize God as **Our Father**. In this prayer, given to us from the mouth of the Savior Himself, we are invited to enter into the prayer of the Son to the Father, configuring us ever more closely into the "image of Christ." The very structure of this prayer teaches us the *order* in which we should pray for what we (rightly) desire. Of seven petitions given, three focus first on the Father and, then, four on man, emphasizing the call heard today to love God and neighbor.

INDULGENCES

Have you ever heard of indulgences? Throughout the history of the Church, especially around the time of the Protestant Reformation, many people have misunderstood and openly abused the teachings on indulgences. As Catholics, it is important for us to be informed on this infallible (unerring) teaching of the Church. CCC 1478 says, "An indulgence is obtained through the Church who, by virtue of the power of binding and loosing granted her by Christ Jesus, intervenes in favor of individual Christians and opens for them the treasury of the merits of Christ and the saints to obtain from the Father of mercies the remission of the temporal punishments due for their sins."

There are two kinds of indulgences:

- 1. partial: frees us from some of the temporal punishment due to sin
- 2. plenary (full): frees us from all of the temporal punishment due to sin

In order to receive a plenary indulgence, a baptized Catholic must have no undue attachment to sin, and must do the following things:

- » perform the action (faithfully recite the prayers asked, complete the novena, etc.)
- » go to confession within 8-14 days before or after the action required
- » receive the Eucharist, preferably on the day the action is completed
- » pray for the Pope's intentions

If the formula is not complete, a partial indulgence is granted.

Indulgences are important because they can lessen the amount of time that we must suffer as a result of our sins.



Look up in your Bibles: Isaiah 1:18 and Romans 5:9.

These Scriptures reveal that when we repent of our sins, God removes both our guilt and eternal punishment, BUT temporal (earthly) punishment may remain. For this reason, the Church can ask us to **perform some action** here on earth so that we may fulfill that temporal punishment here and now.

To help us better understand **indulgences**, consider this example: You make a mess of your room because you are mad at your mom and she forgives you, BUT your room is still messy and you need to clean up your room. The Poor Souls in Purgatory are still cleaning up the temporal effects of sin in their souls before they go to Heaven. They HAVE been forgiven by God and will go to Heaven, but, like the messy bedroom, they still need to clean up their room first.

PLENARY INDULGENCE PRAY FOR THE DEAD

A Plenary Indulgence is granted, under the normal conditions, for anyone who visits any cemetery and prays for the dead from November 1-8. One plenary indulgence can be gained on each of these days applicable to a soul in purgatory.

What is a plenary indulgence?

A **plenary indulgence** is defined in the Catechism of the Catholic Church as a "remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints."




